OUTER BOROUGHS ARE PARTICULARLY IMPORTANT
TO THE REGION. WE'VE SUCCESSFULLY WORKED
WITH YOUR BOARD OF ESTIMATE COLLEAGUES

FROM BROOKLYN AND QUEENS. Now WE'RE <u>VERY</u>
PLEASED TO WORK WITH YOU IN A BOROUGH WITH
TREMENDOUS PROMISE. WE WILL TRY VERY HARD
TO HELP REACH THE FULL POTENTIAL OF THE
BRONX.

THERE'S A DIFFERENCE IN WHAT WE ARE
LOOKING FORWARD TO DOING IN THE BRONX FROM
WHAT WE DID IN BROOKLYN AND QUEENS.

THERE, WE CONCENTRATED ON REDEVELOPING

DOWNTOWNS. HERE, WE'LL BE LOOKING AT THE WHOLE BOROUGH--A BROAD SWEEP OF THE CURRENT NEEDS AND THE FUTURE POSSIBILITIES.

THIS IS NOT OUR FIRST LOOK AT THE BRONX. TEN YEARS AGO, WE PRODUCED A SLIDE SHOW AND REPORT ON THE SOUTH BRONX, WITH THE FORD FOUNDATION. EVEN AT THAT TIME, WHEN CHARLOTTE STREET WAS THE SYMBOL OF THE NATION'S INDIFFERENCE TO ITS CITIES, REGIONAL PLAN SAW THE STRENGTH OF THE BRONX. AT THAT TIME, THE STRENGTH WAS ALMOST ENTIRELY IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD ORGANIZATIONS. THOSE ORGANIZATIONS AND THE IMPORTANT INSTITUTIONS OF THE BRONX HAVE CARRIED THE BOROUGH THROUGH ITS WORST PERIOD AND HEADED IT UPWARD.

REGIONAL PLAN ASSOCIATION STUDIES THE
WHOLE AREA FROM TRENTON, NEW JERSEY, TO
NEW HAVEN, CONNECTICUT. BUT WE'RE NOT A
HOUSEHOLD WORD. I EXPECT THAT MANY PEOPLE
HERE DON'T KNOW MUCH ABOUT US. REGIONAL
PLAN WAS STARTED IN THE 1920s BY FAR-SIGHTED
CITIZENS OF NEW YORK CITY. THEY SAW THE
CITY AS OVERCROWDED. THE BRONX WASN'T

PART OF THE PROBLEM, IT WAS PART OF THE SOLUTION. BY PROVIDING A TRANSPORTATION PLAN FOR THE REGION, OUR ASSOCIATION CREATED THE CONDITIONS THAT ALLOWED PEOPLE TO MOVE OUT OF THE SLUMS AND HAVE A BETTER LIFE--IN THE BRONX AND QUEENS AS WELL AS IN THE SUBURBS.

REGIONAL PLAN ALSO PROVIDED A PARK PROGRAM AND A CAMPAIGN THAT DOUBLED THE AMOUNT OF PUBLIC PARK SPACE. IN THE 1960s WE DID

THE SAME--AND AGAIN CONTRIBUTED TO DOUBLING REGIONAL PARK SPACE. WE ALSO WERE

INSTRUMENTAL IN SAVING THE COMMUTER RAIL NETWORK. IN THE 1970s AND 80s, WE'VE CONTINUED TO WORK ON PARKS AND

TRANSPORTATION AND WERE ALSO WORKING
DIRECTLY WITH OFFICIALS IN CITIES

THROUGHOUT THE REGION TO HELP THEM DEVELOP THEIR ECONOMIES.

WE SPECIALIZE IN PLANNING WITH PEOPLE INSTEAD OF FOR THEM, AND THAT'S THE PATTERN WELL BRING WITH US TO YOUR BOROUGH.

OF BRONX LEADERS TO GET THEIR SENSE OF
WHAT IS HAPPENING AND WHAT SHOULD BE
HAPPENING. WE ALSO DUG UP A LOT OF
NUMBERS FROM OUR STUDIES OF BOTH THE CITY
AND THE WHOLE TRI-STATE REGION. FINALLY,
WE TOOK OUR OWN LOOK AROUND. ALL OF THAT
IS COMBINED IN THE REPORT YOU RECEIVED
